Changes to the AMYAC rule book

In early 2021, several amendments were made to the *Corporations (Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander) Act 2006* (Cth) and the *Native Title (Prescribed Bodies Corporate) Regulations 1999* (Cth). Some of these amendments require changes to the AMYAC rule book to make sure AMYAC complies with the new legislation. AMYAC has prepared the required changes to the rule book and will seek member approval of the changes at the AGM through a special resolution.

CHANGES TO THE AMYAC RULE BOOK

In early 2021, several amendments were made to the *Corporations (Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander) Act 2006* (Cth) (**CATSI Act**) and the *Native Title (Prescribed Bodies Corporate) Regulations 1999* (Cth) (**PBC Regulations**). AMYAC needs to make changes to its rule book to make sure it complies with the CATSI Act and PBC Regulations.

The changes affect how someone becomes a member, how someone's membership can be cancelled, how native title decisions are made and how disputes with AMYAC are dealt with.

AMYAC is also proposing to make changes to the rules about the minimum number of directors required. These changes will not affect what the AMYAC board looks like but will instead make sure AMYAC's rules about board composition are up to date with the current law.

How will the changes be made?

Changes to the AMYAC rule book can only be made if the members pass a special resolution. A special resolution is passed when 75% of members eligible to vote at the meeting vote in its favour.

The resolution considered at the meeting will be:

The members of Antakirinja Matu-Yankunytjatjara Aboriginal Corporation RNTBC (AMYAC) resolve to amend the AMYAC rule book in accordance with the proposed changes discussed at this meeting.

What are the changes?	How will the rules be changed?	Why?
How someone becomes a member	People must use the current membership application form when applying for membership (see rule 6.2(a), Schedule 2).	The rule book refers to the old membership applicant form. These changes reflect the current AMYAC membership application process.
	Directors may not refuse an application if the applicant is eligible for membership (see rules 6.5(c)-(d)).	The amendments to the legislation require that directors must accept an application where the applicant is eligible.
How someone's membership is cancelled	There will no longer be an assessor who makes the final decision if someone's membership should be cancelled (see rules 6.14.1(b)(ii)-(iii), (d), (f)-(m)).	The amendments to the legislation require that AMYAC follow the process in the CATSI Act for cancelling membership. The CATSI Act requires that the decision to cancel membership comes from directors or members, and not an assessor.
	There will no longer be a reviewer who decides to cancel someone's membership on the grounds that they are ineligible (see rules 6.18-6.24).	As above. Note AMYAC can still as a matter of practice have someone who reviews members' eligibility every five years. However, this person can only give the board advice, for directors to make a decision.
How native title decisions are made	AMYAC will not follow the decision-making process in rules 11.3-11.7 and Schedule 4 (see rules 3.2(c), 4.1(a), 11.3-11.17, Schedules 1, 4-6).	This process is based on the old regulations. There is now a new process in the regulations which AMYAC must follow.
	AMYAC will make a compensation application in accordance with the PBC Regulations (see rule 4.1(a), Schedule 1).	This makes clear that AMYAC will comply with the law when making a compensation application.
How disputes with AMYAC are dealt with	AMYAC will have dispute resolution process for people who are or claim to be native title holders, but only where the dispute relates to membership or AMYAC's native title functions. The process will mean that the board will try and informally resolve the dispute with the person. Where the dispute is not resolved with the board, the dispute will be discussed by the members at the next general meeting (see rule 6.3.1(c), 19.6(c), new 19.6(d)-(g)).	The amendments to the legislation require a dispute resolution process for native title holders, regardless of whether they are members.
Minimum requirement for directors	The corporation can have up to 12 directors, and no more than six male and six female directors. The board will have two male and two female senior cultural advisors, and two male and two female directors under 35, where possible (see rules 9.1, 9.2.2(f), 9.2.2(g)-(h)).	The board already has 12 directors. This doesn't change this. The change only means that the board can still follow the rule book if for some reason there isn't 12 directors (e.g. not enough members nominates to be a director, or a director resigns).

NOTICE – AMY NATIVE TITLE HOLDERS' MEETING 19 NOVEMBER 2021

A meeting of Antakirinja Matu-Yankunytjatjara (**AMY**) native title holders will be held in conjunction with the 2021 AMYAC AGM. The purpose of the meeting is for AMY native title holders to discuss, and possibly make, decisions about several matters.

The details for the AMY native title holders meeting are as follows:

Date: Friday, 19 November 2021 **Time:** 9:30 am to 4:30pm **Location:** Desert Cave Hotel, Coober Pedy

Why is there a meeting?

There are several matters on the 2021 AGM agenda which may involve decisions of the AMY native title holders.

For the AMY native title holders to make decisions, the third day of the AGM (19 November 2021) will include a native title holders' meeting.

The purpose of the native title holders' meeting is to:

- provide information on the nature and purpose of the decisions; and
- seek AMY native title holders' informed consent of the decisions.

Who are the native title holders?

According to the AMY Consent Determination (SAD6007/1998), the AMY native title holders are those Aboriginal people who have a spiritual connection to the AMY Lands and the Tjukurpa associated with it because:

1.	They are recognised as an AMY native title holder by the Western Desert Cultural Group (e.g. Antakirinja, Matuntjara, Yankunytjatjara), AND		
	The AMY Land is their country of birth, OR		
2.	They have had a long-term association with the AMY Land and traditional geographical and religious knowledge of the country; OR		
	They have a connection to the AMY Land through a parent or grandparent with a connection to the country.		

What are the decisions?

The potential decisions are decisions which relate to:

- instructions on authorising a compensation application;
- proposed standing instructions for low level native title decisions;
- proposed adopted decision-making process for entering into Part 9B agreements for exploration; and
- confirming native title holders' consent to the Indiana Resources NTMA for exploration, entered into in accordance with previous native title holder standing instructions.

11. Compensation applications	1. As there is no traditional decision-making process under the traditional laws and customs of the AMY native title holders for making decisions of the kind related to the making of an application for compensation under s.61(1) Native Title Act 1993 (Clth), the AMY native title holders agree to adopt the following process:	Sub-section 61 (1) of the Native Title Act 1993 (Clth) states that a registered native title body corporate (RNTBC), on behalf of all the persons who claim to be entitled to compensation (and who are native title holders also called common law holders) can bring a native title compensation application.
	 a. that all AMY native title holders attending this meeting have one vote; and b. having deferred to the views of the Elders present a decision will then be made by a majority show of hands of those AMY native title holders present. 2. The process in regulation 8B is similar to the process in regulation 8 which applies to the making of native title decisions. These resolutions are required to comply with both the NTA & the PBC regulations.

Low level native title decisions	 That there is no particular process of decision-making that, under the traditional laws and customs of the AMY native title holders, must be followed in relation to giving the standing approval, and as a result, a decision to give an approval in relation to low level decisions is made in accordance with an agreed process of: a. Deferring to the view Elders; b. Making the decision by formal resolution, with a majority vote by a show of hands of all AMY native title holders present. Part 9B agreements	 That there is no particular process of decision-making that, under the traditional laws and customs of the AMY native title holders, must be followed in relation to consenting to the AMYAC entering into an agreement pursuant Part 9B of the Mining Act 1971 (SA). If decisions to enter an agreement pursuant to Part 9B of the Mining Act 1971 (SA) are native title decisions and/or native title decisions that standing consent cannot be provided the AMY native title holders agree, for the purposes of Regulation 8(4) of the Native Title (Prescribed Bodies Corporate) Regulations 1999 (Cth), to adopt the following decision-making process in relation to giving consent to enter into an agreement pursuant to Part 9B of the Mining Act 1971 (SA): At least five AMY heritage team leaders are consulted and decide whether to agree to the agreement by a majority vote; or, The AMYAC directors who are elected as Senior Cultural Advisors are consulted and decide whether to agree to the agreement by a majority vote; or At least five senior AMY native title holders, chosen by the AMYAC board taking into account the area that is the subject of the agreement, are consulted and decide whether to agree to the agreement by a majority, provided that AMYAC keeps a proper record of the consultation and decision. 	AMY native title holders have previously provided standing instructions for the AMYAC board to enter into AMYAC's standard Part 9B agreement with proponents for exploration. The Part 9B agreement is an agreement pursuant to Part 9B of the <i>Mining Act</i> <i>1971</i> (SA) which lets proponents conduct exploration activities on AMY land, provided that the proponent follows the heritage protection measures and protocols in the agreement. This year, there have been changes to the <i>Native Title (Prescribed Bodies Corporate) Regulations 1999</i> (Cth) (the Regulations) which affect the consultation and consent requirements with native title holders for decisions which impact native title rights and interests. The Department for Energy and Mining (DEM)'s current position is that under the new Regulations, the decision to enter into a part 9B agreement is a native title decision for which standing consent by native title holders cannot be provided. For this reason, the AMYAC board is seeking feedback from native title holders on an agreed decision-making process for the decision to enter into AMYAC's standard Part 9B agreement, if this decision is a native title decision that standing consent cannot be provided.
14. Indiana Resources NTMA	The AMY native title holders agree and consent to the native title mining agreement for exploration between Indiana Resources and AMYAC, and authorise and instruct AMYAC and its lawyers to do all things necessary including execution of the agreement in the terms (or substantially similar terms) as set out in the agreement considered at the meeting.	The AMYAC board agreed to enter into AMYAC's standard Part 9B agreement for exploration with Indiana Resources on 31 March 2021, in accordance with previous standing instructions from native title holders. On 25 March 2021, changes to the <i>Native Title (Prescribed Bodies Corporate) Regulations 1999</i> (Cth) came into effect. These changes have affected AMYAC's requirements to consult with and seek the consent of native title holders before making a native title decision, including entering into the agreement with Indiana Resources.
